
Learn More About Your Child's Development

The best person to monitor your child's development is **YOU**!



Developmental Monitoring

WHO:

You —parents, grandparents, other caregivers

WHAT:

Look for developmental milestones

WHEN:

From birth to 5 years

WHY:

- To help celebrate your child's development
- Talk about your child's progress with doctors and child care providers
- · Learn what to expect next
- · Identify any concerns early

HOW:

With easy, free checklists – get vours at:

Developmental Screening

WHO:

Healthcare provider, early childhood teacher or other trained provider

WHAT:

Look for developmental milestones

WHEN:

Starting as early as 2 months then periodically or whenever there is a concern

WHY:

To find out:

- If your child needs support with development
- · If further evaluation is needed

HOW:

With a screening test recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics

What if your child is not reaching milestones as expected? Why wait - why worry?

If you are concerned about your child's development, talk with your child's doctor, early childhood teacher or other trained provider about your concerns and **ASK ABOUT DEVELOPMENTAL SCREENINGS!**
