- The brain develops 90% of its capacity in the first five years of life.
- What an infant or toddler does during the course of a day influences lifelong learning patterns.
- Oral and dental health from birth impacts overall health and learning.
- The number and variety of spoken words that a child has by age 5 influences his/her ability to be a successful reader.
- Sharing books and reading aloud with your child from birth allows for special quiet time together and supports the joy of reading.
- High quality preschool or childcare is positively related to children's success in school. Poor quality can have negative effects.

School Success Goes Hand In Hand With Good Attendance! Early Years Matter! Build good attendance habits early!

Did You Know?

Missing one or two days every few weeks can:

- Make a child fall behind.
- Develop poor attendance habits that are hard to break.
- Make it harder to develop early reading skills.
- Affect the whole classroom as learning has to slow down to help children catch up.

What Can You Do?

- Set regular bed times and morning routines.
- Don't let your child stay home unless he or she is truly sick.
- Develop back-up plans for getting to school if something comes up.
- · Avoid medical appointments and extended trips when school is in session.
- Talk to your child's teacher or social worker if your child seems anxious about going to school.
- Teach your child that attending school is non-negotiable children CAN'T learn if they aren't in school.

What to look for and ask when observing an early childhood program

Choose an early childhood program where the teachers consistently:

- ***** Use a gentle tone of voice.
- * Talkin a warm and friendly way.
- ✤ Laugh with the children.
- Show affection to the children.
- * Respond to children's needs.
- Bend down to speak to children at eye level.
- Provide individual attention to children.
- * Help children learn to get along with others.
- * Talk with parents about their children.
- * Refrain from using a harsh tone of voice or using put-downs.
- Understand child growth and development.
- * Provide exciting and engaging learning activities.
- In preschool programs, use the CT Preschool Curriculum Framework to plan learning experiences.

5 STEPS TO FINDING A GOOD CHILDCARE OR PRESCHOOL

- 1. START EARLY: Finding the right childcare option can take some time.
- 2. MAKE A CALL: Call your Family Resource Center or call 211 Infoline and ask:
- ✓ What are the licensing requirements in my area? Remember that licensed programs meet basic regulations required by law.
- ✓ What types of programs are available?
- ✓ How can I get information about complaints and licensing violations?
- ✓ Is there any childcare financial assistance?
- 3. VISIT, ASK QUESTIONS & TAKE THE TIME TO OBSERVE.
- ✓ How many children are there for each adult? One adult to 3 or 4 infants and toddlers; one adult to 7 or 8 preschool aged is best.
- ✓ How many children are in a group? In a center, group size is 8 or less for infants and toddlers, or 17 in a preschool program.
- ✓ Ask about caregivers' training and education.
- ✓ Ask how long the caregivers have been at that center or providing care in their homes.
- ✓ Find out if the provider is accredited by a national organization (such as NAEYC). Accredited programs meet higher standards of quality.

4. MAKE A CHOICE. Think about what you saw at each visit and make the best choice for your child and your family.

5. STAY INVOLVED. Meet with caregivers regularly, visit your child at childcare and join in special events.

Every person, child or adult, needs to be emotionally and mentally well in order to live a happy life. Living with mental and emotional problems, including addictions, takes a hard toll on entire families. IS YOUR FAMILY LIVING IN ANY OF THESE SITUATIONS:

In a shelter?

In a motel or campground due to the lack of an alternative adequate accommodation?

In a car, park, abandoned building, or bus or train station?

Doubled up with other people due to loss of housing or economic hardship?

Then your school-age children may qualify for certain rights and protections under the federal McKinney-Vento Act.

Your eligible children have the right to:

- Receive a free, appropriate public education.
- Enroll in school immediately, even if lacking documents normally required for enrollment.
- Enroll in school and attend classes while the school gathers needed documents.
- Enroll in the local school; or continue attending their school of origin (the school they attended when permanently housed or the school in which they were last enrolled), if that is your preference.
- If the school district believes that the school you select is not in the best interest of your children, then the district must provide you with a written explanation of its position and inform you of your right to appeal its decision.
- Receive transportation to and from the school of origin, if you request this.
- Receive educational services comparable to those provided to other students, according to your children's needs.

If you believe your children may be eligible, contact the local liaison to find out what services and supports may be available. There also may be supports available for your preschool-age children.

Youth Service Bureau's

What is a Youth Service Bureau (YSB)?

A YSB is an agency that is responsible for providing services and programs for all youth to develop positively and to function as responsible members of their communities. Additionally, YSBs assess needs of youth, identify gaps in service and coordinate services to fill those gaps. The services YSBs provide may involve programs related to youth development, juvenile justice, truancy prevention, and connection to community resources. **United Services, Inc. Youth Service Bureau** serves Brooklyn, Canterbury, Eastford, Killingly, Plainfield and Sterling. **TEEG's Youth Service Bureau** serves Thompson, Woodstock, Pomfret and Putnam.

A YSB may recommend or provide for any school-aged child:

- •Academic supports which could include credit recovery and/or college prep programs
- •Referral or access to individual or family mental health services and/or medical care
- •Referral to other community-based intervention programs (including in-home services) targeting truancy and other behavioral concerns
- •Educational advocacy
- Mediation
- Mentoring
- •Parenting classes
- •Positive social activities such as art, enrichment, and sports
- •Referral for clean clothes, healthy food, stable housing, and/or transportation needs

What will happen when a referral is made to a YSB*?

- •Once the YSB has received a complete and signed referral, they will reach out to the family via phone or send a letter to the family's home.
- •YSB staff will explain the process to the family and ensure consent to move forward.
- If the family agrees to participate, the YSB will arrange a time to meet with the student and the family and gather information (including demographics, family & school information and needs and strengths of the student & family).
- •The YSB will work with the school to address the individual needs of the student, such as assisting families with school meetings to support the student.
- •The YSB will identify available and appropriate community supports for the student and review them with the student and their family.
- •Based on family input, YSB staff may provide programming within the YSB and/or make appropriate community referrals.

*This process may be different based on the needs of the family and/or the resources available in your community.

YOUTH SERVICE BUREAU'S – CONTINUED

Tips to maximize school success:

Partner with the school: Develop and strengthen relationships with your child's teachers and administration.

Be involved: Know what's going on in your child's school and classroom. Monitor your child's school progress - read school newsletters, contact teachers when you have questions, attend parent/teacher conferences, monitor progress through online grading systems, etc.

Pass on high educational aspirations: Encourage positive discussions around school. Talk to your child about the importance of an education and the benefits of school attendance from an early age.

Regularly monitor your child's electronic devices and social media: Talk with your child about what's appropriate and boundaries on social media. Open a line of communication without judgement or consequences. If your child is under 18, it's your responsibility to know phone passwords, spot check social media / texts and be aware of the "apps" they are using.

Prioritize schoolwork: Stress that school and homework come before friends, sports and social media. Engage with your child around homework and follow through with consequences if they don't meet expectations.

Support your child's school activity participation: Encourage your child to be involved in extracurricular actives and programs. Kids who feel connected to their school are more likely to have better grades and school attendance.

Get help so your child succeeds: If your child is struggling, <u>don't be afraid to ask for help – it takes a</u> <u>village</u>! Contact your child's school to discuss supports.
